

Our Integrative Approach



We support girls during very young adolescence (ages 10-14), a critical time for their emotional, physical, and social development, and an age where they are exposed to increased risks to their rights and wellbeing. Our approach, inclusive of five key programs (Trained & Equipped Teachers, Girls Education & Leadership Clubs, Safe & Inclusive Classrooms, Gender-Based Violence Prevention, and Clean Water & Sanitation) ensures that girls in primary school have access to the resources and support they need to stay in school and make informed choices about their bodies, their education, and their futures.

Expanding Our Reach

In support of our 5-Year Strategic Plan to expand our work across rural Kenya, our team has been focused on reflective learning, strengthening our partnerships, refining our Theory of Change, and building our capacity in preparation for the journey ahead. In January, we will add 10 underresourced public primary schools to the Flying Kites School Network, bringing our reach to 19 schools, 418 teachers, and 7,455 students. We are thrilled to be welcoming these new schools, students, and teachers to the Flying Kites School Network – expanding the reach and depth of our impact.

Measuring Our Impact



The impact of our work is measured through a set of core programmatic outcomes, designed to evaluate knowledge on key topics, access to services and support, and agency related to decision-making as indicators of our progress to ensure that adolescent girls in our community can thrive. Our Monitoring, Evaluation, and Learning framework prioritizes both quantitative and qualitative measures, utilizing a variety of tools including observations, focus group discussions, surveys, activity logs, and external evaluations.

As a result of our Gender-Based Violence (GBV) Workshops, we saw a 34% increase in teachers who accurately identified the types of gender-based violence (including corporal punishment, female genital mutilation, physical abuse, verbal abuse, and sexual abuse) (46% at baseline to 80% at endline).

We saw a 62% increase in the number of primary school teachers who reported feeling confident to report gender-based violence and ensure access to victim services following participation in our Gender-Based Violence Prevention Program (38% at baseline; 100% at endline).

After completing a year of our Teacher Training, 65% of teachers achieved a level of proficiency in the development of basic technology skills, including being able to access online resources needed to develop engaging lesson plans and foster equitable learning environments (0% at baseline; 65% at endline).

88% of schools meet the basic level of water and sanitation service in schools, as defined by the WHO/UNICEF Joint Monitoring Programme, which requires that students have access to clean water, safe toilets and hand washing facilities at school (0% at baseline; 88% at endline).

Impact Highlights 1

With a driving purpose to improve the life outcomes of girls, Flying Kites partners with teachers to transform primary schools so that girls can come to school, stay in school, and thrive in school.

Increasing gender-equitable attitudes in schools

In late October, we conducted Gender Equity Workshops for leaders across our 9 Network schools. Using components of USAID's Doorways Training Program, we trained primary school teachers and Child Protection Volunteers to introduce concepts of gender equity, discuss beliefs, and examine gender roles. After our teachers went back into their classrooms to facilitate their own workshops on gender equity among their students, the number of girls who agreed they should be treated equally in school increased by 32% (48% at baseline to 80% at endline).

Developing tools to prevent gender-based violence

In October, we trained 193 teachers and 3,270 students across 9 Network schools on gender-based violence (GBV) prevention. Following the workshops, all participating teachers signed our zero tolerance policy for GBV and took a pledge to uphold this practice in their own school communities. 100% of participating teachers were able to correctly identify their legal obligation to report instances of GBV and the appropriate referral pathway for cases of GBV.



Improving girls' self esteem and academic performance

"Many girls were performing poorly in academics because we feared the teachers and suffered low self esteem. We did not have anyone to share our challenges with, especially period-related challenges, but that has since changed. Our performance and esteem have really improved."

Program Spotlight:

Clean Water & Sanitation

Access to safe and reliable water is a human right. And yet, the majority of students we serve lack access to clean water, safe toilets, and hand washing facilities at school, posing significant risks to their health and well-being, particularly adolescent girls who often miss up to 4 days of school each month when menstruating. To address these barriers to learning for primary school students in our School Network, we drill protected schoolbased boreholes, install piping, build handwashing stations equipped with soap, install water tanks for storage of clean water, and construct community water access points.



In 2024, your support helped us build:

2 COMMUNITY **BORFHOLES**

Providing 6,187 members of the Heni Primary and Mucibau Primary school communities with access to safe and reliable water

6 STUDENT **BATHROOMS**

Ensuring that 2,025 boys and girls at Mucibau Primary, Karati Primary, and Chania Primary have single-sex, functional, and private toilets.

9 PIPFD WATER **SYSTEMS**

Guaranteeing access to water required for drinking and for cooking daily nutritious meals for all 5 099 students in our Network
